Aims:




- Bring young breeders together from different breeding associations, countries and languages
- Encourage the education of young people in the skills necessary for successful sport horse breeding
- To organize the WBFSH-Young Breeders World Championships to provide young breeders from all parts of the world with an opportunity to compete in different disciplines relevant to sport horse breeding
- Above all, to get together, make new friends and create new contacts

History

- Formed in 2001
- 2001 Verden (Germany) 26 contestants, 15 studbooks (11 of them German), 4 countries
- 2003 Minderhout (Belgium) 36 juniors, 36 seniors, 12 studbooks, 5 countries
- 2005 Aarhus (Denmark) 28 juniors, 28 seniors, 7 studbooks, 4 countries
- 2007 championship not held
- 2009 Officially recognised by WBFSH as international championship



- 2009 Cork (Ireland) 45 juniors, 54 seniors, 15 junior teams, 17 senior teams, 10 countries
- 2011 Lyon (France) 54 juniors, 60 seniors, 18 junior teams, 20 senior teams, 9 countries
- 2013 Bollerup (Sweden) 62 juniors, 69 seniors, 21 junior teams, 23 senior teams, 12 countries
- 2015 Hartpury (Great Britain) 63 juniors, 80 seniors, 17 junior teams, 21 senior teams, 9 countries



Developments since General Meeting 2013

A Manual on how to run the championships and a constitution has been drawn up circulated for comment to all members. An ad hoc committee made up of the three current Board members (Inken Gräfin Platen, Norman Storey and myself) plus Ann-Charlotte Cardier (SV), Maja Mulvad (DV) and Sonja Lowenfish (AWR) has been set up to help draw up and comment on 1 and 2 so that main issues had been addressed before the main draft was circulated to members, who had additional the chance to add their ideas, that had been implemented.


Now the actual championships and the organization runs under these rules.

This step was very important for reliability and stability. Nevertheless further developments will be possible and be prepared by the board. Delegates are always welcome to put in ideas for development.



Manual and Rule Book for the International Young Breeders World Championships

The manual and rule book contains detailed information regarding the organization and execution of the championships, including sections on the constitution, rules of conduct, and organizational procedures.



Developments since General Meeting 2013

For the Championships 2017 Canada invited in all associations. Like at the championships before the costs for transport and stay will not be payed by the organising studbook.

Therefore every association should decide up to the end of the year if they will take part. If there would be too less teams Canada would not organize.

In July 2015 8 studbooks had given their "yes" for Canada, 6 their "no" and lots a "try to".

The Canadians did decide to organize the Competition.

Next question to be answered: Which studbook will invite for 2019?

IYB Financial Situation: Funds from WBFSH



- WBFSH grant to organising studbook of Championships 3500 €
- Annual WBFSH Budget for Internet support etc 3000 €
- Since 2013 the IYB has saved the money it does not need for overseas travel: 6.378,31 € (up to January 2015)
- Support per Studbook for overseas travel given so far: 375 € (so far Canada/ United States)

Probably available for 2017: 14.000 €

Possible support per studbook for Overseas travel: 600-1.000 €
